This year, Pentecost falls on May 23rd. To me, part of this season in which we find ourselves is akin to the time before the first Pentecost. We are waiting expectantly for a better day that sets farther on up the road, but we do not know exactly where, and we don't know when we will receive this gift. Still, we are waiting for it.

For us, waiting can seem rather passive, and for many people it is. They wish for a better outcome. They act as though they've put a few dollars on the lottery instead of investing themselves in what truly matters.

After Jesus' Ascension into the heavens (**Acts 1:6-11**), the disciples returned to Jerusalem and went into the upper room where they were staying. They were not passive. They devoted themselves to prayer, which is more than a wish or a chance at a big payout. Prayer, for them, was wholehearted; it was active; it was full engagement.



Something else made their prayer unique. It was done with one accord (see **Acts 1:14**). This wasn't about everyone having their own view and then taking a vote to see where the majority was or what the survey said. Instead, they prayed together and let the Holy Spirit unite their hearts with the one goal to glorify God and to receive the gift that Jesus had promised them. (Spoiler: the gift proved to be the Holy Spirit, which further united them as one.)

When the Holy Spirit burst onto the scene in **Acts 2**, the disciples were still gathered together (**v 1**). Likewise, we need to gather together in these days and wait upon the Lord. Like the disciples, we need to gather in one accord. We need to come together actively searching for the Lord's will, and we need to do this wholeheartedly and fully engaged.

To that end, I am planning to do something different this summer. In past years, prior to COVID, summer meant a

season of Wednesday Bible Studies. This year, I would like to gather in the sanctuary, the fellowship hall, or the chapel, to pray, to have holy conversations, and to sing praises to God.

Honestly, like the early disciples, I don't have a grand plan, but I am calling upon us to gather in Jesus' name and to see what He reveals to us through the Holy Spirit. To that end, I have asked James, who has been helping to lead our Praise Team, to organize the first of these events. It will be a time of prayer and praise and will be May 26th at 7PM here at St. John's. The scriptural theme will be **John 14:19-26**—Worship in Spirit and Truth.

Now that I have set my vacation and continuing education dates for the summer, we can begin to set dates for June-August. Other dates may be on Wednesday like the first one or they may fall on a Friday or Saturday evening or possibly a Sunday afternoon.

I'm hoping to find others to lead a bit of music or song. Otherwise, it will be a time of conversation and prayer if I'm the only one leading the time. The goal, for me, is to have God's people gather in prayer and to seek for the Lord. As Jesus taught, when we seek, we shall find (**Luke 11:9-10**). When we seek the Lord, we find so much more than peace and comfort in the moment; we find purpose and power that propels us forward in God's will to do His work on earth as it is done in heaven.

There are several biblical passages that contain the phrase "seek the Lord," but as I am writing about Pentecost in **Acts**, chapter 15, verses 16-18 says:

"After this I will return, and I will rebuild the tent of David that has fallen; I will rebuild its ruins, and I will restore it, that the remnant of mankind may seek the Lord, and all the Gentiles who are called

by My name, says the Lord, who makes these things known from of old.”

God seeks to build His kingdom here on earth, and He uses His people as instruments of His love to do this work. Every good work that we do can only be done in Christ, and every good work begins with prayer. That is why I am calling on the church to commit to a summer of prayer as we prepare to do future good works that are greater than ones we have done before that our Heavenly Father may be glorified.

This commitment to prayer isn't just about everyone attending special times of prayer and praise. As a Christian, you can pray anywhere, at any time, with anyone—that is the gift of having the Holy Spirit upon you. I am asking the members of the church to commit to 100 prayer gatherings EACH month of June, July, and August. That isn't 100 prayers by 100 individuals or 25 prayers by 4 individuals. I am calling on St. John's members to gather with other members to pray together. This is St. John's members praying for friends, colleagues, cashiers, and strangers that you meet.

Prayers can be focused on growing the church, discovering a better vision that unifies our members, or helping our brothers and sisters to discover spiritual gifts and finding ways to use them to strengthen the church. Additionally, prayers can be about the needs of people we engage who are outside of the church. Doing this becomes a way to get non-believers to think about how God cares about them. It is also a comfortable way to share our faith with others while lifting up Christ while empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Indeed, these are days of waiting and looking forward like the time of the disciples before Pentecost. It is also a time to have urgency, as the time of fulfillment is not far down the road but just around the corner. Understanding that, gives our prayers a sense of urgency and expectancy coupled with a commitment to being ac-

tively engaged in what God is about to do. So, come and pray May 26th if you can. Likewise, plan to help lead or contribute on future dates (contact me for ways you can do that).

Most of all, just start where you are and pray. Find a prayer partner or two at the next worship service, and set times to pray together. Open the directory, call an old friend or make a new one, and commit to pray together. Advertise on social media, if you are so savvy, for people to gather with you online to pray. You can post prayer meetings in the bulletin or on the church Facebook page or website. Or, you can look for opportunities to pray where God plants you. Ask the Holy Spirit to put 5, 10, or 20 people in front of you each week with whom you will take time to pray with them and for them.



Prayer changes things. We all know that but little changes because we are not committed to prayer. Now is the time to change that and to follow through as the disciples did.

Who knows? Maybe a new out-breaking of the Holy Spirit is just around the corner—a new Pentecost is on the horizon. When it does, revival will come to our land, and a renewal will fall upon Christ's Church.

May it be so and soon. Come, Holy Spirit, come!

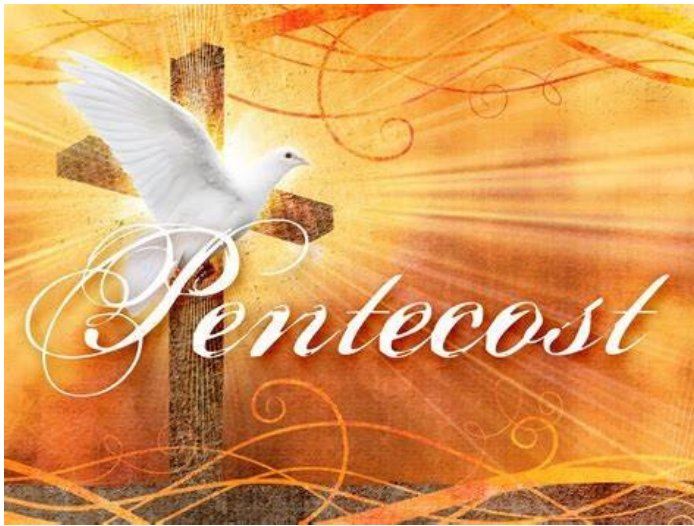

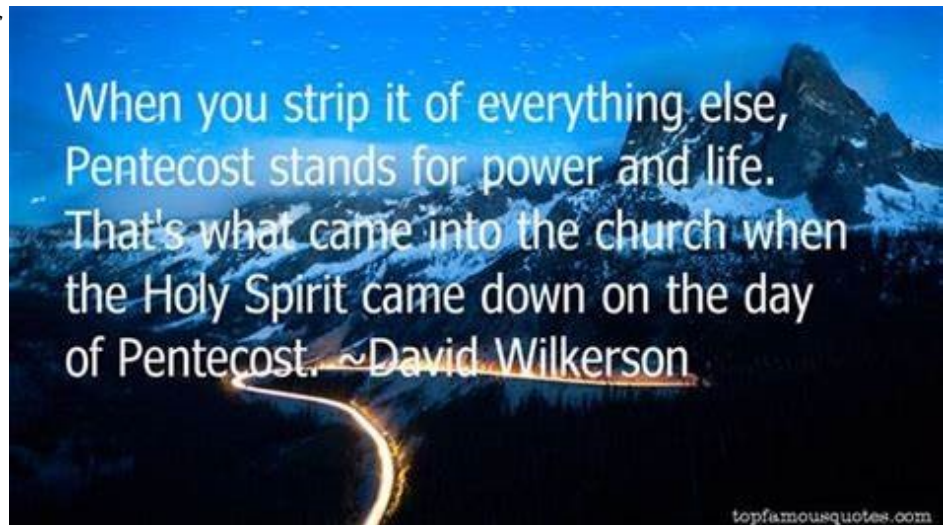

BELLS & STEEPLES

As Christians we are to called to patience and perseverance. I know many of you have commented about the 1877 Cornerstone which now is displayed in the Skylight Room. Researching the history of this through the newly translated records brings to light just how these Christian virtues were practiced by our founding members.

First mention of a steeple in the minutes:

“Kenton, OH 1863

General meeting on Sunday, 31 May 1863 at the Evangelical Protestant St. Johannes congregation. The church council and the ward members gathered after the completed Sunday service, where the president called the meeting to order. Important business was handled.

2. Ehrhart Blum made the suggestion and Benedict Fink supported it, saying a new roof with pine shingles and a steeple should be put on the church, which was passed unanimously.”

Second stage of constructing a steeple (turned out to be the base for one that did house a bell).

“Monday evening, 18 July 1864

The church council gathered to vote once again, if the church steeple should be finished completely at once or piece by piece. The majority decided on completely. It was also decided that Allies Meyer, who has done other work on the church building, would be tasked with this job for two hundred and ninety dollar - \$290, with all the material being delivered to him. Allies Meyer would have to do the work well and durable, which would be checked by the building committee. K. Zulauf, G. Resch and M. Gerlach are that committee. Since there was no other business, the meeting was adjourned until an unknown time.

Attested Konrad Zulauf.”

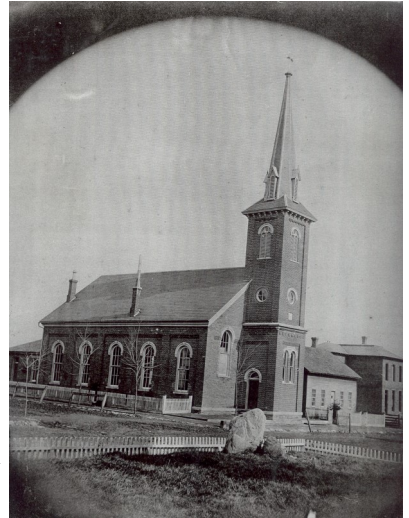
In 1865 a Bell Society was formed to purchase a bell for the new Tower. John Pfeiffer was sent to Springfield to purchase and deliver the bell. He did so by ox cart. A journey that would have taken an 11-to-12-day round trip.

Third mention of the steeple (tower) when project was approved.

“Monday evening, 25 May 1877

The church council together with the various committees gathered at the church and Mr. Pastor Diehl, who was presiding, opened the meeting with a prayer. First the finance committee reported, that although they had not been able to acquire the money, they ensure that they would be able to. With the in mind, the building committee could move forward in their planning, so that the start of construction could start as soon as possible.

2. The building committee reported, that they were unable to reach a conclusion about the truss. The situation was discussed by the council and the whole committee and after all ideas and points were discussed, the following was decided: 1. The truss should be raised 5 to 6 feet and shall be covered in slate. 2. The tower should be 10 feet over the rooftop, build with bricks and should ca. 100 feet tall. 3. That the tower, the new addition and the truss, as well as the removal of the inner wall, and the opening of the pulpit alcove, shall be given out with a contract. 4. That the congregation will order the needed brick, but all other materials shall be obtained by the contractors. The meeting was adjourned”



The actual construction is finally mentioned.

“Monday night, 6 Aug 1877

The church council gathered at the parsonage and the meeting was opened by a prayer of Mr. Pastor Diehl. After the protocol of last meeting was read and approved, the committee responsible for finding a new local for the Sunday service during the repairs, shared their news. They had reached out to Pastor Waddel of the United Presbyterian Church and said church would be available to the congregation to use every Sunday afternoons for no charge. It was decided, that this offer would be accepted with gratitude and in friendship.

The following question was also being discussed: Should we let Mr. Heinrich Schnaut do the inner work of our church or not. The decision was, that Mr. Schnaut would be supervise the work.

2. That the day laborers should be selected of the congregation, that the wage of the trades people should not be paid more than \$2.00 per day, that day laborers should not be paid more than \$1.50 per day and that the supervisor should not paid more than \$2.50 per day.”

As you can see it took over twenty years for the plan for a Church with a bell and real steeple to come to fruition. It would be the following year, 1878, before the project was completed. So, when we get frustrated with the pace of change at church, remember this is not a new experience. God’s timing always trumps our human expectations. It is our job to persevere.

- Organ expenses of \$2,000.
- Jerry gave the report from the financial committee.
- The farm income will be invested with a cap \$50,000 and the balance will be tiered invested. Since Willis Anderson and Steve Mays annuitant's of investments have passed, those funds will be reinvested other than annuities since annuities do not make as much money now on the market. A motion was made and seconded that the Carl Lotz scholarship fund will be re designated to any student for further education. Motion passed. Shawn Dyer will head this committee this year only. In house applications only will be accepted.

3) Christian Education—Michele Sherman

- Christian education reminded the council that Vacation Bible School will be June 7-10 and informed as to Michele's plans for this program. Committee report was reviewed by all council.

4) Women's Ministry - Toni Pfister

- Not doing anything right now

5) Worship, Arts & Music - Nancy Weaver

- It was noted that larger gloves are needed for the communion servers. Going forward what is the commitment for the contemporary music position.

6) Personnel Committee - Jerry Pfister, chairperson

- He will be addressing more reviews and children's ministry position. Denny Sprang, Janitor, was commended for an outstanding job.

7) Pastoral Relations - Carol Wilcox

- The committee will be meeting April 11, 2001. Rudy Freer will be chairman of this committee going forward.

8) Trustees: Greg Martin, Jerry Pfister

- Audio Visual: The security cameras are being finalized. Camera for the Jerry Cross Park will be reviewed further. A \$1,000 piece was returned with replacement part found at a lower price.
- Van: The van steps are ordered and the wrap for the bus are continuing to progress.
- Farm: The hunting proposal for hunting leases is still under consideration.

9) Missions, Evangelism - Heather Erwin/ Mark Sherman

- Mark announced we will be having spring work day on April 25. More information will follow. Carol said she would pay for mulch if Mark had workers to spread the mulch.

10) Pastor's Report - Pastor Randall

- Pastor Randall's report was reviewed by the council.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Safety of Church/Alice Program—will be handled going forward with Shawn Dyer and Mark Sherman
- Rental agreements- tabled for further review
- Church inventory - tabled—will be completed this summer 2021
- Church Survey—A motion was made and seconded to continue with survey using the NCD source. Motion passed.
- Red Cross paperwork will be finished soon.

NEW BUSINESS:

- A motion was made and seconded by to pay Pastor Randall's dental bill. Motioned Passed.
- Two names were presented to the board for replacing the open trustee position. A motion was made and Seconded to Elect Anna LaWarre for the balance of the year open position of Trustee.
- Rebecca Craig proceeds from the sale of her house and farm will generate a Council designation fund for infra-structural improvements.
