
These days, our culture seems obsessed with freedom. There are debates about how much freedom is good, or whose freedom trumps whose. We see this in discussions about whether Elon Musk's proposed purchase of Twitter will make "America's town square" more free by opening the flow of thoughts and ideas to more people. We see it also in the debate about Roe v. Wade where one side promotes a woman's freedom 'to choose' and another promotes the unborn child's right to be born and to live freely in this land.

When we enter into debates about freedom, we often do so seeking our own freedom or freedom for those like us. Rarely, do we seek the greater good and the bigger picture as our nation once did. Even rarer, do we think about what freedom means for those who are called to live their life in Christ and for Christ.



In John 8:36, Jesus says, "So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." This isn't an absolute freedom to pursue your heart's desires. First, that would be a libertine fantasy that would lead to chaos as each person has conflicting desires and personal definitions of what freedom means for them and others. Secondly, and biblically, we hear the Holy Spirit speaking through the prophet in Jeremiah 17:9, "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick; who can understand it?" Apart from God, our heart is corrupted. There are some who bring that corruption into the church to justify their behavior, to exclude others from the fellowship, or to divert others from focus-


ing on Christ and taking His message into the world, which is our Great Commission (the purpose for which we are to use our freedom—see **Matthew 28:18-20**).



As a nation, we should strive to live out those ideals etched into our conscience on the bronze plaque on the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty. People, in their natural state, know they have no freedom. Instead, they have people guising their lust for power as a pursuit of personal freedom at the expense of other people's freedoms. Our nation was built by those who fled such abuses and oppressions in their native lands. We as a nation welcomed those who yearned to breathe free. We believed that those deemed the "wretched refuse" could flourish if only they were granted freedom to grow and thrive. We as a nation proved that notion correct as we have thrived and grown in prominence and wealth due to the innovation of those cast off by their native lands. Those who pursue true freedom bless others with the fruit of their labor—those blessings are an amazing byproduct of breathing freely.

The Bible understands that notion. That is why Peter was inspired by the Holy Spirit to write the ironic sounding verse I Peter 2:16. There, Peter reminds all Christians to live freely, but to never use that freedom as an excuse to sin or to pursue evil. Rather, we are to live as God's slave. Ironically, those who live as God's slaves are the freest people on this earth because they



know what it means to truly be set free in Christ.

Proverbs 10:9 is contained in the image on the previous page. There it talks about if you walk in integrity, you will walk securely. As Peter was saying, we curb our heart's appetite to walk in the way of the LORD. A person who walks in integrity is governed by God's Law, which puts us on a rigorous path. That path produces character. As someone once said, "Character is who you are when no one is watching." In Christ and led by the Holy Spirit, we know the true freedom of being the person God has called us to be. No longer are we slaves to sin or the heart's deceitful desires that pervert what is true and good.

This year, as our nation celebrates freedom on the Fourth of July, I want you pause and reflect upon the freedom of integrity that rests in Christ. When you understand what that freedom is, it is not a burden. Quite the opposite, this freedom calls us to lay down our pretense, our prejudice, our prided, and our sin. Then, and only then, can we live as a free people.

As a free people, we will share this freedom with others. We will export it to others as we proclaim the Gospel of Freedom in Christ. We will import the broken wretches

of our community into our church as we invite them to come and celebrate what it means to be free indeed in Christ. Such freedom will drive us to build up others in their faith. We will allow those who yearn to breathe free to do so. In the end, we will find that teaching and training others to live free indeed will end up blessing us and our church and our community for generations to come.

Living freely in Christ, we will discover the power of being *The New Colossus*. That is the name of the sonnet by Emma Lazarus written in 1883 that graces the base of the Statue of Liberty. The French were inspired to make this a collaboration with the Amer-

icans when they gifted our nation this statue. We as a nation would have the freedom to decide what should stand beneath this grand monument to freedom and liberty.

Those who decided ensured that all who looked on that monument should consider that liberty is for all. As such, it demands work, sacrifice, and stewarding in each generation. It would not come naturally, but it needed to be taught and emulated. It demanded that those who had freedom needed to walk it out with integrity and to maintain themselves on the narrow path of integrity.

May we continue to use our Christian freedom to do the same. May we sacrifice our freedom to teach others the Way in Christ. May we pour our blessings into those who are yearning to breathe free. May we break the shackles of sin, oppression, and the heart's deceitful of desires with the hammer of Christ's freedom.

May we live free in Christ. May we live free indeed!

Let's take a look back to the year 1932, the 3<sup>rd</sup> year after the crash of 1929 and the beginning of the worst of the Great Depression. The average wage in Ohio was \$1,048 per year down almost one third from the 1929 average. So, people were struggling with falling wages. All kidding aside, in 1932 you could buy a new car for \$650, gas for 18 cents a gallon and 10# of potatoes for 29 cents.

Now let's look at St. John's. In 1932, St. John's was by far the wealthiest church in Kenton with a membership that included many of the wealthiest people in Hardin County. The Church giving in envelopes that year was \$1,920.07. Of this amount 10 individuals gave over \$25 or over equating to ¼ of total giving. This figure represented giving by 170 people, adjusted for family (144 family units) giving yields \$13.31 per wage earner or 1.3% of gross income. This was about half of what it was pre-depression.

Using the same metrics *this year* our envelopes are back to the 1928-29 levels of 2.6% of gross income per giving family unit. Imagine adjusting to loss of a third of your income today. Believe it or not if inflation continues at the current rate for another two years, we'll be there (our real purchasing power will buy much less than it does today). But now we have a government willing to print money it doesn't have to pay people who won't work. As during the pandemic, we might get some of that. But don't count on it.

If our study of the Bible tells us one thing, it is that change will happen. As Christians we are to expect pain and suffering as well as a future void of those earthly realities. We as members need to commit our time, talent and treasure in the future at levels that may be painful, but remember "At the end we win".
